# Inserting content in Dreamweaver

## Activity Overview

Text, links, and graphics are integral parts of a web project. When working on any web project they will need to know how to add and style text, add images and graphics, and create links. Use this activity to introduce your students to working with links, text, and images and graphics by using Adobe Dreamweaver.

## Activity Steps

1. Text, links, and graphics are integral parts of a web project. Text must be readable, consistent, and well organized. Links must work and take a user where they want to go. Images and graphics should be well placed and complement the sites content. Introduce the goal of the activity to use Dreamweaver to insert text, links, images and graphics to a web project.
2. Distribute the technical guides and review how to add text to web pages, including adding lists. <sup>4.4, 5.3</sup>  
Demonstrate how to copy and paste text from a word-processing document and how to import text from a word-processing document.

3. Using the "I do, we do, you do" method, demonstrate how to insert images into the web page the students created by using the Insert panel. Demonstrate how to import assets and graphic elements, such as logos and buttons, from Photoshop and Illustrator into the Dreamweaver Assets panel, including the library, for later use throughout the site. Finally, demonstrate how to resize images from within Dreamweaver

4. Discuss the differences among the types of links: absolute, site-root-relative, and document-relative. Discuss link targets: \_blank, \_self, \_parent, and \_top. Discuss named anchors and ID attributes. Demonstrate how to add links on a webpage in Dreamweaver.

5. Ask students to create a sample web page and add text, images, links (including text-based links to other web sites), alternatively have them use these skills on a web project they are currently working on.
6. Explain that in every web project they will work on, these skills will be needed throughout the development of the project.
